New Phone System

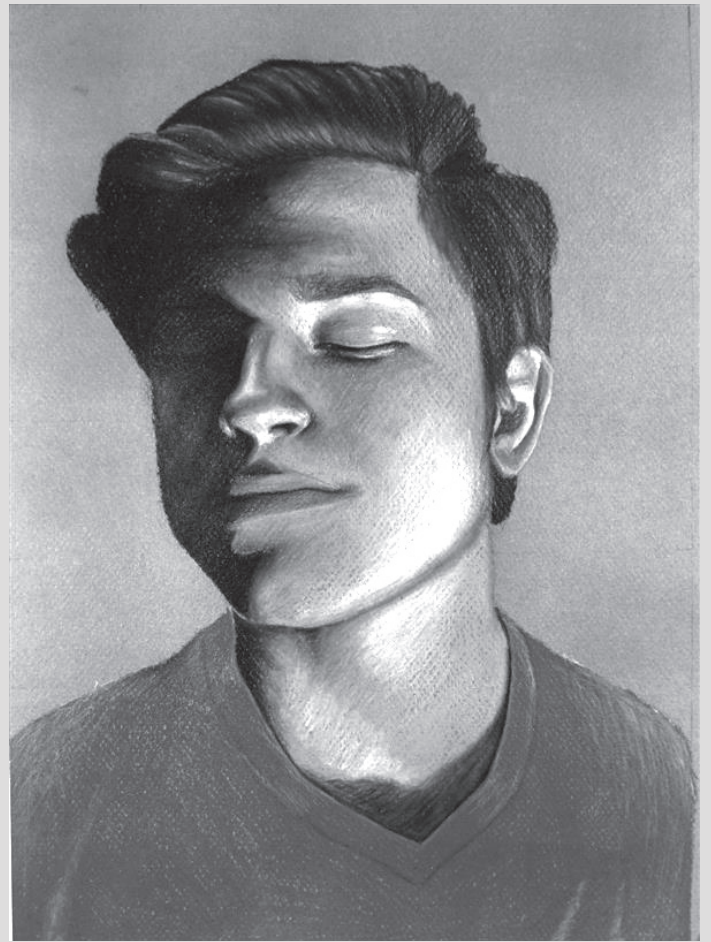

National Medal Winners 2018

Mishawaka High School once again made a big showing at the Regional Scholastic Art Awards this year. The competition involved over 100 schools submitting work for the February 2018 exhibit at Century Center in South Bend. MHS artists took a tenth of the total awards and did especially well in the Drawing and Illustration category, claiming a fifth of the total awards in that category. 40 Cavemen artists received 84 awards for their work, making this year the best on record for MHS. Big winners were Seniors Brianna Squadroni, Kassandra Myers and Madison Kreil. In March two Mishawaka students, who's Gold Key winning artwork went on to compete in New York were awarded national medals from the Scholastic Art Awards: Geneva Denney Moore and Olivia Krieg.



Self Portrait after Rockwell by Geneva Denney-Moore

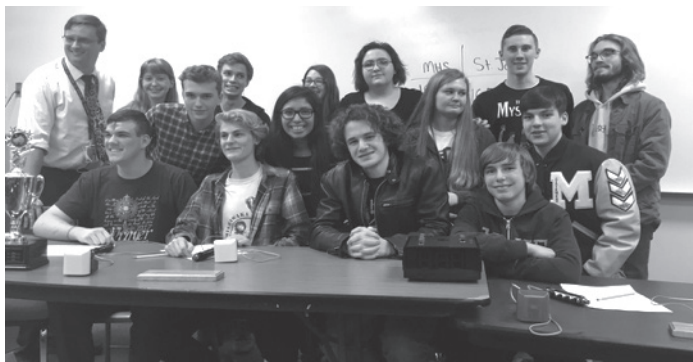

This season marked the fourth consecutive time the Cavemen have qualified for the state tournament. Previously the Cavemen had only qualified for State one time back in 1996. The highlight of the 2017–2018 season was the Cavemen's strong performance in the St. Joseph Valley League Post-Season Tournament. In that tournament the Cavemen first bested the Penn Kingsmen for the second time in the season. They then earned an historic win over the defending League Champions, St. Joseph High School, gaining Mishawaka's first championship title in school history and marking St. Joe's first tournament loss since 2010. 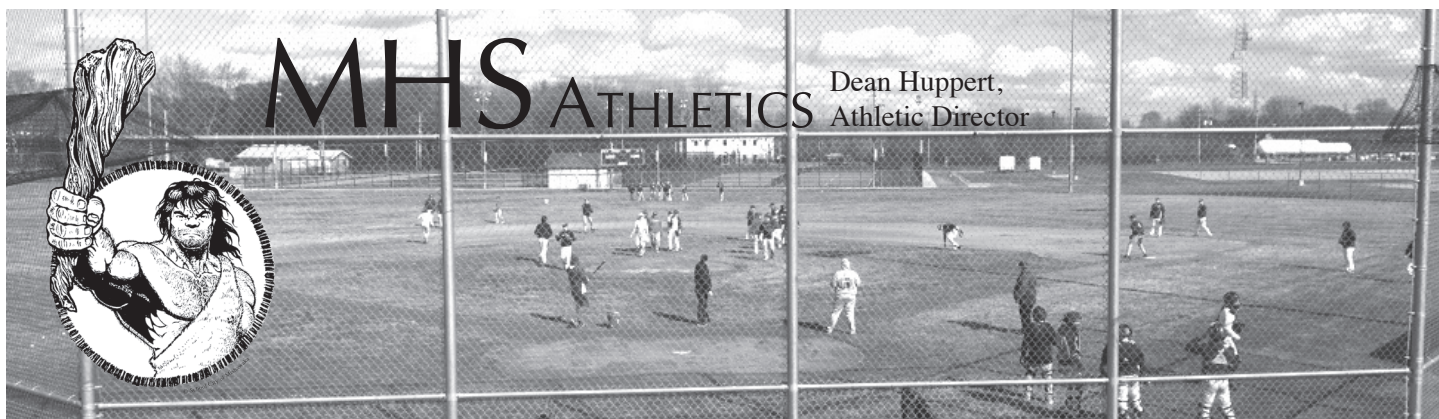

The Athletic Department had one of its most challenging Springs in decades. The end of March and first two weeks of April had a lethal combination of rain, snow and record cold temperatures. Postponements were the norm and practice in the gym made things challenging for all of the coaches and student athletes. Once the games began, it was a chess game to get NIC contests in and find time to improve amongst the barrage of games that needed to be played.

The girls track program has not only risen above the falling temps, but they have thrived in multiple events. On April 10th, the girls beat Penn at TCU Freed Field 79–73. The Cavemen had 7 first place finishes from Rylin Bagarus, Paishence Johnson, Faith Quintana, Devyn Miller and Asia Salazar.

For her efforts, Paishence Johnson was named the WSBT Burger King Outstanding Student Athlete of the Week.

The team recently placed 2nd in the Northern Indiana Conference Championships, Sophomore Johnson led the charge with titles in the 100 and 200 meters. Bagarus and Miller made 2nd team all-conference in the 100 hurdles and disc while Madison Kreil and Salazar were 3rd team All-NIC in the 300 hurdles and high jump. The ladies have some serious contenders to make it to state this season.

The boys track team keeps building. Deric Bailey was the NIC Conference champ in the 800. He said after the meet, “There as a lot of time and hard work put into it. Our conference is so strong in the 800. You have to grind. I just went out and proved it and ran hard.” Shane Glasco also brought home and NIC title in the high jump. “He said, “Best feeling ever. I’ve been training so hard for it. I finally made it.” Meanwhile Junior Joe Walker was the NIC Runner-up with a personal best jump of 20’ 6 ½”.

The Mishawaka softball team keeps grinding away. As the season was winding down, the Cavemen were 14–10 and 7–4 in the NIC. Senior Sydney Kempf has been a shining light in the leadoff spot. The Butler bound center fielder has filled in at 3rd base when needed and has continued her incredible career at the leadoff spot.

The golf team has had a shining light with Senior Jacob Roeder. The Mishawaka Medalist helped the boys finish 5th out of 8 teams at the Kaeppler Invitational at Morris Park Country Club. He made us all proud by winning the prestigious Clara Kaeppler Sportsmanship Award.

The tennis team got their first victory of the year at South Bend Clay. #1 doubles saw a win from Emma Watford and Quora Neff, #2 doubles won with Brianna McDonald and Kacie Shambaugh. And the Highlight of the Night came from freshman Lydia Muturi. She didn’t find out that she was playing her first varsity match until minutes before introductions. The rookie came through with the deciding point to help the Cavemen secure the 3–2 victory. She said, “Mishawaka Power! I’m so proud. I’m so proud of my team and I feel really, really good.”

A big hire this Spring came with Keith Kinder taking over as the Mishawaka Football Coach. Only the 4th coach in the past 32 years, Kinder replaces Bart Curtis who is leaving to coach a school in the Northern Lakes Conference. Kinder is a 1999 Jimtown graduate who won back to back state championships. As the quarterback, he led his team to a 30–0 mark in his final two years and also helped his baseball team make it to the state finals. He said, “It’s an opportunity I’ve looked forward to my entire career. Now I’m ready to serve and lead this football program for hopefully many years to come.”

The Cavemen baseball team has had and up and down season. As of this writing the team was 10–10 and finished tied for 3rd in the NIC with a 7–5 record. Mishawaka lost to LaPorte by 2 runs and four other games by 1 run, including a 6–5 setback against their rivals across the river. Junior Sam Shively had 10 strikeouts in that game.

Excitement on campus continues to grow as Mishawaka’s new 8-lane track is scheduled to be finished in July. The School Board also approved a new scoreboard that will have video capabilities for all events in Steele Stadium. Director of Athletics Dean Huppert will be seeking community support this summer from sponsors looking for a chance to get their company logo on what will no doubt be a huge communication tool for the school.

When school starts next year, Mishawaka will not only have a bigger training room, but the Strength and Conditioning Center will be remodeled with all new state of the art equipment including fitness tools for all student athletes. The center is designed to be welcoming for girls and boys with an open concept and a conditioning expert in the room at all times. To accomplish this, the corporation has added a Strength and Conditioning Coordinator and an Assistant Strength Coach to help kids improve health, endurance, speed, agility and strength.

And finally we can't forget the kids. Congratulations to John Young Middle School 8th grader Sarah Beshara. She broke

the school record of 5:35 in the 1600 meter this season with a time of 5:30. And thank you to Liberty Elementary runner Issy McNeil. Born without calf muscles, the little warrior has inspired many with her courage and effort during meets. Running the 400 may take a little more time, but kids and adults see the dedication and determination as she crosses the finish line. This little girl embodies #MishawakaWay and reminds us what is important. We are all One Mishawaka and we want to do our best to make our school, family and community proud.

The future is bright for all Cavemen!

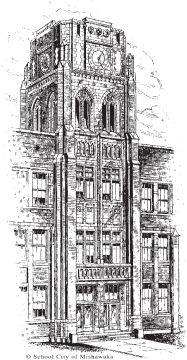


Committee for School Improvement

This year in advisory, students have been participating in activities each Tuesday. These "Tuesday Activities" are grade-level specific and are intended to address a college, career, and citizenship curriculum. The freshmen activities have focused on transitioning into high school and skills needed to be successful in high school. The sophomore activities build on those skills, in addition to engaging in initial discussions and research for jobs and college information. The junior activities focus on setting goals, meeting deadlines, and college and job research. Finally, the senior activities not only focus on college and job information, but also activities designed to help students adapt to living on their own after high school (about insurance, taxes, setting budgets, renting, etc).

Sophomores, juniors and seniors also had the opportunity to hear from local community members who gave presentations

on a variety of topics. Seniors attended a presentation by an IUSB financial aid officer, Emily Hoover, about different types of financial aid available in paying for college. Sophomores and juniors each attended a presentation by Doc Partlo and other visiting members of the military about the different branches of the military and career opportunities available within. Our own Mishawaka High School resource officer, Officer Faltynski, shared information with students about how to interact appropriately with law enforcement. Finally, juniors and seniors were encouraged and reminded to celebrate safely, especially at the end-of-year events, in a presentation by Lieutenant Williams of the Mishawaka police department.
