Potential is Everywhere. Opportunity is Not. TM

In order to ensure that all MHS students have quality access to high-speed internet at home, Mishawaka Schools has partnered with Sprint in the 1Million Project. The nation-wide effort provides free wireless devices to students who may have no or limited access to internet services at home. Students qualify for the free phones or hotspots if they don't have internet service at home, have limited access to a device (for example multiple students in the home with a single computer or tablet), have low speed service, or other situations that result in limited internet access. Phones provide unlimited calling while on the Sprint network (no roaming).

The phones and hotspots provide sufficient capacity (3GB/mth, lower speeds thereafter) to perform a typical month's worth of homework. Having the capability to access the internet anywhere, will help a student study and research in a setting that is familiar to them. There are no costs to SCM families for participation in this program, but additional data may be purchased for a low rate to supplement monthly

usage. All devices contain CIPA compliant filtering software that cannot be disabled.

A parent consent form is required. Please ask your MHS student to pick-up a form from the front office, Mrs. Long (Room 167) or the Student Help Desk (Room 162) and return in order to take advantage of this terrific program.

Committee for School Improvement (CSI)

School Improvement Goals for the 2017–2018 school year have changed. We have one over-arching goal to have students be college, career, and citizenship ready upon graduating. This goal is to be achieved by several interventions done within individual courses and advisories. The first intervention states that teachers will incorporate technical reading into their curriculum. This can include

informational texts, tutorials, etc. The second intervention states that teachers will incorporate ratios and graphing activities into their curriculum. Third, teachers will require students to always write in complete sentences and grade students on a constructed response once per grading period. Finally, teachers will instruct students on soft skill and a college, career, and citizenship ready curriculum in both content area classes and advisory.

The structure of advisory has changed slightly for this year. Activities during advisory are as follows:

Mondays and Thursdays will be travel days. These will follow the same format as in the past, but the days on which traveling is allowed is now different.

Tuesdays are the big change. These are now days that provide specialized grade-level activities. Students will be involved in activities directed more to the specific needs within each individual grade-level. This might mean getting acquainted with what high school has to offer as a freshman or college and job information for seniors.

Fridays will still be used as mentoring days for advisory* students.

*Advisory is not held on Wednesday due to the late start.

Technology Advancement

MHS is experiencing exciting progressive development on the technology front. In companionship with deploying SCM iPads to every Freshman student, we have equipped many classrooms with an Apple t.v. to enhance the learning and teaching environment. Teachers are finding and implementing impressive, innovative ways to connect curriculum with engaging live and digital lessons. Herr Schrieber's class will be remotely interviewing the author of In The Mouth of The Wolf, additionally Mrs. Bill demonstrates many of her art lessons with a YouTube channel. The possibilities are endless and many of our teachers are eagerly experimenting with the new tools and concepts that come with our technology advances. With added technology comes added need for tech support. We are proud to announce the pilot of our student tech support class. Led by teacher Mr. Smith, the class is producing a great group of student tech interns that have done an outstanding job of keeping up with supporting the tech needs and repairs on devices in both our building and John Young Middle School.

Referendum/Miscellaneous Funding Improves MHS

With the passing of the referendum on the November 2016 ballot, citizens of Mishawaka approved nearly 13 million dollars' worth of improvements for Mishawaka schools. Although 13 million appears to be a large sum of money, it barely scratches the surface for needed repairs and improvements when reviewing the 2015 School City of Mishawaka needs assessment that was configured by Schmidt and Associates of Indianapolis. After reviewing the assessment, Dr. Speicher and the "High Priority Facility Committee" prioritized the needs and placed safety of our students, faculty/staff and visitors as the number one priority. In addition to the safety enhancements, several mechanical and structural improvements were a high priority in order to maintain an educational environment at all schools.

When dissecting the improvements at Mishawaka High School alone, great strides have already been made with an outlook of projects to continue, well into 2018 and possibly 2019. To begin and to clarify, the MHS football field drainage and improvement project was **not** part of the referendum project. This project was funded through the sale of SCM real-estate land that was owned by the school corporation, to the City of Mishawaka. The field was long overdue and in desperate need of assistance to enhance drainage and remove the native soil. With the maintenance plan moving forward, the field will continue to improve annually.

After finalizing the football field project in the early spring, the stadium electrical and lighting enhancements were installed and completed early August 2017. New improved stadium lighting as well as surrounding areas; i.e. courtyard and gate entry ways, enhanced safety for all visitors. Work on the new secure vestibule to screen visitors coming into the high school was complete in early October. Along with the secure vestibule at the main entrance, electronic control access will be upgraded to existing electronic strike exterior doors. Currently all interior and exterior doors are being

assessed to enhance safety by re-keying and installing lock mechanisms within the classroom. Alongside of the control access MHS will receive state of the art security cameras and enhanced video monitoring that will display all areas of the school inside and out as well as areas that were not covered in the past, including gymnasiums, stadium etc.

Another safety enhancement that will take place in late winter early spring 2018 includes the demolition and addition/ replacement of a new state of the art running track. Currently unsafe conditions of the existing track have forced competitions and practices off campus for nearly six track seasons. The new track will extend from 6 lanes to 8 lanes, allowing MHS the opportunity to host major events including state tournament series; i.e. Sectional, Regional and possibly Semi-State if awarded by the IHSAA. Although we will have to wait until the end of July 2018 to enjoy the new track, the swim team can now enjoy the results of a renovated swimming pool. On October 18, 2017 the swim team took the first plunge into the pool that features state of the art mechanical system that will reduce chemical use and provide years of enjoyment without the fear of another mechanical breakdown.

Other major projects currently taking place now and in the future at MHS include new roofs over the east gymnasium and auditorium that is slated to be finished in January 2018, a new stage floor projected to be completed Wednesday October 25th, new windows in classrooms set for spring 2018, Elevator Upgrade-January/February 2018, Masonry/Terracotta work over the auditorium and east gym entriesspring 2018 and west entry pool door reconfiguration-summer 2018. With these exciting improvements MHS will also use donations and sponsors to remodel the stadium courtyard in the summer of 2018 as well as landscape the grounds in the fall 2018.



High Expectations! Creating a Culture of Excellence! When Dr. Dean Speicher told me about the Mishawaka Way, it was obvious that I wanted to be a part of it. As the new Director of Athletics at Mishawaka Schools, I feel very lucky to be at a place with tremendous pride and tradition. I feel equally blessed to work with amazing teachers and coaches and have a great team in our department with Assistant AD's Sherry Keyser and Ryan Watson along with Athletic Secretary Linda Weber.

We have tried to take our department to the next level by making big strides online. Final Forms is a new system for all high school and middle school athletes that simplifies the registration process. The Go Fan ticket network allows fans to buy general admission and season tickets at their home or on their phone. We're now paying officials with Arbiter that takes paper checks away and helps us pay officials quicker. We'll soon be launching a new athletic website called CavemenSports.com. It's where fans all over the world will be able to find stories about our coaches, teams and athletes. If you haven't signed up for our Twitter page, go to Mishawaka Sports@CavemenSports. We're putting out positive information every day that will make our alumni proud.

A big coup for Mishawaka Schools was signing a multi-year contract with WSBT 96.1 FM. Not only is the Michiana Sports Leader committed to carrying all of our football games home and away, but they will also be the voice of the Cavemen for home basketball games. If that's not enough, every Thursday from 7–7:30 P.M. there is a special show called Cavemen Corner that is dedicated to Mishawaka Sports. It's in a great time slot sandwiched between the Sports Beat talk show and the Notre Dame Brian Kelly Radio Show.

You will hopefully see a difference in our TV technology in the future. We now have three cameras and some big time equipment that was purchased by the Mishawaka Education Foundation. The Mishawaka Sports Network already broadcasts many of our football and volleyball games on YouTube. It's a big improvement from what we've had in the past. The expectation going forward is to find interested students to make this the best program in Northern Indiana.

We hope our students appreciated the discounted season tickets this year. Our sale increased our sales in a big way. And an anonymous donor gave us funds to give each high school student purchasing an all-sports pass a Maroon Platoon T-shirt. If you haven't gotten one, they are still available in the athletic office.

Mr. Calderone and our administration has put us in charge of making 19 varsity sports better. We're in negotiations with one of the area's top swim clubs and we also got a grant from the USTA that will help 72 third through 8th graders learn the fundamentals of tennis. The Mishawaka Parks Department has also been a big help starting a junior soccer program that we hope can get momentum heading toward the JYMS. While we have a great foundation in many sports, helping some of the teams get feeder programs started earlier should give us a big boost.

If you haven't gotten a Fall sports program yet, check out the articles on Volleyball Coach Steve Anderson and Football Coach Bart Curtis. I've been around some of the all-time greats and these are Hall of Famers you should get to know. While former Mishawaka State Champ Steven Sandefer comes home to lead our wrestling program, our boys basketball staff has a veteran coach who's well respected in the state of Indiana. Ron Hecklinski spent 18 years at Anderson High School. He also coached the Indiana All Stars and McDonald's All American team. Ask him sometime about coaching LeBron James.

Success on the fields and courts isn't our only priority. We're hoping all Mishawaka students will realize how proud this community is and how they can make a difference. There have already been meetings with Mrs. Walton about Cavemen Care. You'll be hearing about this organization and how you can contribute. We can all find ways to help our friends and neighbors and together make an impact around our city.

This is your school, our school I'm proud to be a part of the excitement moving forward. Mishawaka

is a school on the move. Our department will respect the traditions of the past. But we won't be satisfied with mediocre results. "High Expectations"! "A Culture of Excellence"! It's the Mishawaka Way.




