
Remo D. Belli '45







Remo Belli was born and raised in Mishawaka. He graduated from Mishawaka High School in 1945. Remo began drumming at the age of 12 and at age 16; he started work as a professional musician before serving in the U.S. Navy, where he also played in a band. After his discharge, he moved to California, where he performed in clubs and toured with Anita O'Day & Billy May. Remo invented the first successful synthetic drumhead in 1957. From there, he started his own company, Remo, Inc. Until then, drums were extremely expensive because drumheads at that time, were made from animal skin. Remo's invention allowed every kid to purchase a drum who wanted to start a band in his or her garage. Most music historians consider the convergence of that invention, to be one of the ingredients that allowed Rock 'n Roll to explode into a cultural phenomenon. Almost every recording artist from all genres of music are drumming on a Remo drumhead. From the Beatles to Buddy Rich to Grateful Dead drummer, Mickey Hart, to Travis Barker, Blink 182 drummer, the list is a who's who of music.

Remo could have easily left his mark by doing nothing more than lead the way as the most successful drumhead manufacturer but he saw drumming as a way to help the human condition. Remo worked with music therapists to create drum tables that allowed a half dozen Alzheimer patients to beat on the same instrument because the socialization and communication results were so much more powerful having them all tap on the same instrument instead of separate drums. He also found a way to instruments to meet the special needs of children and adults with developmental disabilities and autism. The prescribed use of rhythm-based music therapy created remarkable results with veterans suffering from Post-Traumatic Stress (PTSD). Remo even dreamed up a way to make drumming accessible for people with sound sensitivities through his invention of Comfort Sound Technology, making rhythm accessible as a tool for engagement in learning. Remo's Lullaby Ocean Disc and Remo Gato Box are used as tools in the critical care provided to help premature babies improve sleep and feeding patterns. Remo's commitment and support of music therapy and willingness to innovate instruments tailored for health applications helped make these outcomes possible.

What an impressive career and human being this MHS graduate was. Information for this article was obtained through many internet sources.

A Hero's Tale

Oscar Schelstraete and Darren Hess are not the only two parishioners who saved St. Joseph church from burning to the ground. The hero of this story is a fourth grader from long ago.

Once upon a time, when St. Joseph had its own school and the student's went to mass every day, a little boy Danny Raab, saved the church. At one time there was a bank of vigil lights by the Christ the King statue. While waiting for Mass to start one day a woman, a leader of the parish, went to light a candle and say a prayer. 


Heirlooms Tell the Tale

Do you remember a time when doctors routinely made house calls and a nurse's uniform included a cap and cape? Thanks to Jeanine Reynolds and her generous donation of family heirlooms to the Hannah Lindahl Children's Museum, those times will never be forgotten. One of those items was a 1947 Yearbook from St. Joseph's School of Nursing in Mishawaka, as well as a nursing cape and cap her mother, Patricia (Parr) Barone, wore after graduating. Patricia and her twin sister Thrasilla both attended Mishawaka High School. After classes they would do military work at Uniroyal to help with the war effort. Once high school was completed, they attended nursing school and graduated in 1947. Patricia married C.V. Barone in 1952. She retired in 1979 and passed away in 1999.

Other donated items belonged to Jeanine's father who was a Mishawaka family physician. Dr. Barone graduated from Notre Dame and completed his residency at St. Louis University. The donations included his daily hand written physician's log, several medical journals, a metal scale used to weigh babies, and the bronze name plate that hung at his office. The final item was Dr. Barone's small black bag that he carried when he made house calls. Inside was a stainless steel box that held a hammer to test reflexes, a pair of tweezers, a hypodermic syringe, a blue cotton towel, two stainless steel bowls, a white kidney shaped bowl and a glass bottle with a glass stopper.

Dr. Barone cared for many families, however, the majority of them were Belgians and Italians. When any of his patients didn't have money, they paid with homemade meals and vegetables from their gardens. No checks, credit cards or billing statements were needed. He provided free samples from pharmaceutical companies as the first line of treatment and would only write prescriptions when those didn't work. Patients came first! Dr. Barone spent 53 years as a family physician in Mishawaka, and passed away in 2000.
