Please check out the 200 hall's 2017-2018 website: sites.google.com/Mishawaka.k12.in.us/200-hall. This website has general information to stay updated on what's happening in the 200 Hall and in each of your student's classes. In math, students have been working hard to prepare for ISTEP. They have practiced using percentages to determine markup and discount as well as percent change. Students have also extended their understanding of geometry to include circumference and area of circles along with surface area and volume of cylinders. These are important functional skills that have real life applications.

In Science, the students are working hard to understand how scientists use evidence found in rock strata to determine earth's geologic time scale. Some activities that students are doing to learn this are card sorts, online lessons, and independent research about an era that they choose to investigate. After we study earth's geological time scale students will begin looking into the convection currents that occur in earth's mantle that cause the tectonic plates to move in three ways: convergent, divergent, and transform. The students will be challenged to understand that the landforms created at plate boundaries are determined by the type of movement that occurs there.

In English, the students just started the award winning novel "The Lions of Little Rock", by Kristin Levine. This novel is about a young girl, Marlee Nisbett, who is in the 7th grade at a middle school in Little Rock, Arkansas in 1958 - the year after the Little Rock Nine went to Central HIgh School. Tensions are high due to the Governor (Faubus) disagreeing with integration and closing all of the high schools. The middle schools remain open, so Marlee thinks she's starting an average school year...lt turns out to be anything but average!

Marlee has a hard time talking, and is shy. That is, until she meets the "new girl", Liz. She is confident, outspoken, and not afraid to stand up to bullies. But, Liz carries a heavy secret. The students will learn that Liz's mom wanted her to have the best education possible, so she was "passing" (that is, she is African-American, but is light-skinned enough to play it off that she is white) in this middle school. Racial tensions rise, some students and parents begin to attack Liz (after she is kicked out of the school), but Marlee realizes that her skin color doesn't change the fact that Liz has become her best friend. Students will discuss themes, historical events, and vocabulary throughout the novel study.

In Healthy Lifestyles, we just started playing floor hockey. Kids did drills to practice and now we are playing games. We also are continuing to go in our fitness room to work out to try to improve fitness test scores. In Health we will be starting our Growth and development unit. A parent letter will be

coming home with more information. We also will be taking our kids on a field trip to see the movie "Wonder" about a boy with facial differences who, up until now, have prevented him from going to a mainstream school, and becomes the most unlikely of heroes. This will open up a discussion with our kids about bullying and how our actions have reactions and consequences.

In **Social Studies**, students will explore Ancient India through model reading of informational text. We will read about the invasions and rulers of the region, culture and making of a civilization. We will explore the Harappans, their contact with other civilizations, their achievements and the effects of migration of people. Students will then explore the "Origins of Hinduism", learning how the people became distinct groups in India, the influence of the Aryans, and how Hinduism and Jainism developed as religions.

Finally students will explore the "Indian Empires" to learn that the Mauryan Empire unified most of India and about how the Gupta rulers promoted Hinduism in their empire.

In **Social Studies** students are studying and examining the United States Constitution. Students had to memorize and recite or write the preamble of the Constitution. Students have been working hard to identify the parts of the Constitution and learn more and more about how the United States was founded. They started with the preamble and are making their way through the amendments.

In **English** with Mrs. Kowalewski, students are finishing reading Tom Sawyer. They have worked hard for a few months now to read a difficult book and analyze the plot, characters, and many other aspects of the book. They will continue to work on their writing and reading throughout the rest of the year.

In Science, students have been collecting data and determining what traits are passed down through genetics and what traits aren't. Students interviewed peers, teachers, parents, and family about things like hair lines, handedness, ear lobe detachment, and many more traits. They then analyzed the data and came to conclusions about the information. While collecting data students were engaged and interested in finding what traits everyone had and what Science and genetics could to them about each other and their families.

February and March marks the start of ISTEP season. 8th graders begin ISTEP testing March 2nd and have three days of testing. Students have been working hard in their classes to try their best in order to improve their scores from the previous year. We as teachers have tried to focus our students on a growth mindset when if comes to the ISTEP test. The goal is to improve from where we were last year. In order to do that, students and teachers talk consistently about doing better every day. We do not expect students to get everything correct all the time. The hope is to constantly improve and try to do better every day. As we head toward the end of the year, and the second round of ISTEP testing, encourage students to work hard to achieve growth moving forward.

Our National History Day Open House was a great success. Family members and friends enjoyed all of our students' presentations. National History Day® (NHD) is a non-profit education organization that offers year-long academic programs for more than a half-million middle and high school students around the world. Each year students are challenged to conduct original research on a different theme. This year's theme is Conflict and Compromise in History. The largest NHD program is the National History Day Contest that encourages students to conduct historical research on a topic of their choice. Students enter these projects at the local and affiliate levels, with top students advancing to the National Contest at the University of Maryland at College Park. Good Luck to all of our participating students!

In **Science**, January was a very busy month as JYMS students complete their Science Fair project. Special thanks to Tracey

Ackerley for all her hard work in organizing the event. January is also the kick off for the Fluid Power Action team at JYMS. Six teams of four students will design engineering projects while competing against 30 other teams from the area. Daman Products Inc. sponsors the event for local students. After six weeks of work, the teams will compete at Bethel College in March.



News from F. A. P. A. (Fine Arts, Practical Arts)

Read 180 and Math Lab: In the land of Read 180 and Math Lab, 15 students graduated from the program. Students have achieved their goals to accomplish all the requirements for completion of the class. They were able choose an elective from the offered FAPA classes. It is always exciting to see the progress students are making on a daily basis.

Choir: We are working on songs for our March field trips. Information and permissions slips will be out in February. We will need parent chaperones.

7th graders are learning a song to help memorize the US states and capitals, and 8th grade is singing "The Preamble" song. What a great way to learn social studies facts.

Music: New students in music this semester! In addition to learning new music content, students are working on how to manage and increase self-efficacy in the classroom. Our classroom does not operate on a list of rules, instead we follow one creed: You are free to choose but you are not free from the consequence of your choice. Please practice reinforcing positive choices at home!

Throughout this course, students in general music will be learning to play piano in addition to

studying music theory. For assessment, students record their best performance of required pieces on their laptops and share the videos on Google Classroom. Ask your student to share their latest performance at home! You may also want to listen to the unique music students have composed and recorded using the *Incredibox* and *Soundtrap* online music mixing programs.

Practical Skills: New semester, new students. Students are exploring the world of Twitter, creating a class Twitter page, and learning all about the entire concept of Tweeting.

They are also learning the fundamentals and expectations of a proper discussion not a debate. They will hold a roundtable discussion with Administration coming and providing the topic.

End of Year Field Trips

This year, students will need to earn the opportunity to attend our end of the year field trips. Each student must earn a minimum of 7 points before the trip to participate in the outing. Any student that is suspended during the 2nd semester of school will be automatically unable to attend.
