

# JRC Students Earn Trip to Sky Zone

The students in Mrs. Berkey's JRC class worked together for twelve weeks to earn a trip to Sky Zone. We sat down as a family to come up with a plan to earn a reward. The boys really wanted to go to Sky Zone and were willing to pay for it themselves. Then we had to decide how they were going to earn it. Behavior modification and lesson completion are the two main goals of our class. Each class they can receive six points for completing their lessons and having good behavior. This includes walking in the halls and when at lunch. We decided that 9,000 points total would be a good goal. After twelve long weeks of ups and downs they made it. On March 31, they enjoyed the fruits of their combined labor and spend the afternoon at Sky Zone. We are planning a trip with all the 8th grade JRC students to visit the Elkhart Career Center to help them see what possibilities the future holds for them.

# How do Social Issues Affect Me and My Family?

Eighth graders just finished a project this week, where each contributed to the whole on social issues that faced teens in St. Joseph County. The Driving Question was..."How do social issues affect my family and myself?". Students spent a total of three weeks researching, interviewing, and learning about social issues that affect teens in St. Joseph County. They learned how one social issue in society can have a profound effect on them. They were shocked by data they received from their interviews with Police Officers, CPS, the Homeless Shelter Director, Counselors, recovered drug and alcohol abusers, and the list continues. The students elected a leader, a reporter, a recorder, and a gofer for their production team and held daily conference meetings to keep the project moving towards creating a class slide presentation on all the information they collected. Each student had to

speak during their portion of the presentation to give even more insight into the social issue they worked tirelessly on for the project. Again, each student's efforts contributed to the whole and they were graded as such. Students came to realize that teens face social issues every day and they do affect them, and in turn their entire family/community.

Ms. Masterson's classes would like to thank Officer Madison for helping to coordinate interviews for them, as well as, the JYMS Counselors, and Mr. Moore who took the time to answer all their questions during their researching. Also, we are grateful to our Administration and Office Secretaries who answered countless e-mails or spoke with students while they collected data.



# Twenty-First Century Scholars Last Chance To Enroll – Your 8th Grade Year

Indiana started the Twenty-First Century Scholars in 1990 to ensure that every student can afford a college education. *Income-eligible* 7th and 8th graders who enroll in the program and fulfill a pledge of good citizenship are guaranteed to receive up to four years of undergraduate

If you attend a private or an independent institution, the state will award an amount comparable to that of a public institution. If you attend a participating proprietary (private career) school, the state will award a tuition scholarship equal to that of Ivy Tech Community College of Indiana.

As a Twenty-first Century Scholar, you can get help finding free tutoring, a mentor and a part-time job, and once you get to college, students who are Twenty-first Century Scholars receive support to finish their college degrees.

But first you must apply. 7th and 8th grade students and their parents must complete the application by June 30,

You will need to have your student's Social Security Number and parent or legal guardian's Social Security Number or Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN) on hand. You will also need 2016 gross income amounts for all members of the household with you and a valid e-mail address available.
